

It was a fantastic experience and a tour that we would recommend to any football fan.




Railway Children Theatre Trip

Owl Visit to Batchwood

Four rescue owls from Wings of Love Rescue Centre came to visit Batchwood on Tuesday 23rd June.

Students were given a presentation about the owls detailing their key characteristics, where they came from and why so many had to be rescued. Students were really impressed to find out that a barn owl can hear the heartbeat of a mouse from half a mile away and that owls with dark eyes hunt at night and owls with bright orange eyes hunt during the day. After the Q&A session, students were allowed to handle the owls and really enjoyed looking closely at the patterns on their feathers.



A Year 8 student said, "I was impressed by the colours on the feathers and how friendly the owls were, I really enjoyed holding them. I think the school should get a pet owl as our mascot." Although Batchwood isn't planning to

adopt an owl anytime soon, it was great to learn about them at school.'

PGL Trip

Day
One

On the 17th June, sixteen students and five members of staff made the journey to Marchants Hill PGL Centre in Surrey for the annual residential trip.

When the intrepid group of adventurers arrived on site the staff arranged a big game of football and games of ultimate Frisbee, and then a well-earned picnic!

It was then on to the first activities. The students were split into two teams. One team faced the perils of abseiling down a 25ft wall, while the other group used deductive reasoning to solve problems of increasing difficulty.

In the evening we split into teams to play Ambush, a huge game of hide and seek in the woods

surrounding the PGL site. It was led by a PGL **instructor called "Bagpipes" a former military man** who taught the students the art of camouflage and of being very still and quiet. After the game we went back to our rooms where some of us showed off our musical talents and sung songs and played guitar. Some students joined in but most were content to sit in the sun and just listen.

We woke up to beautiful weather on the second day which was perfect for all the outdoor activities. Students and staff competed in archery tournaments, with many students stating it was the first time they have ever used a bow and arrow. One instructor said it was the loudest example of team work he had ever heard at PGL and it really helped the students to overcome their fears. We then made our way to the longest zip wire at PGL. The students even encouraged Mr Hurley to overcome his fear and he completed the zip wire challenge. When he touched the ground the students gave an almighty cheer and congratulated him, showing another example of great teamwork and support for each other.

After a well-deserved supper, we went to the Oasis, a room with pool tables and air hockey. Some students also watched a film or played basketball, while others were content to sit outside and look at the stunning views from the balcony.

On the final morning we took part in air rifle shooting with most of the students shooting rifles for the first time. The instructor was very impressed at how well the Batchwood students listened to safety instructions and followed them to the letter.

On Wednesday 17th June, six students visited the Riverside Fishery in St. Albans for a day of fishing. Each student spent the day with an experienced fisherman. The students were taught how to hold their fishing rods correctly, what type of fish they may catch in the lake; these included roach, perch and bream, and how to attach maggots to the fishing hook. It was a beautiful, sunny day and everybody thoroughly enjoyed themselves. We stopped for lunch and enjoyed a barbeque which was provided for us.

The students caught a variety of species and size of fish. At the end of the day the students were presented with certificates. Two students from



Batchwood also earned a medal each. One Year 9 student was presented with a medal due to the amount of fish he caught during the day and another received a medal for the largest fish as well as his behaviour and attitude throughout the day.





Willows Farm Trip

Some Year 8 students went on a tutor reward trip to Willows Farm this term. First of all, they went to the bouncy castle area and had a great time, jumping up and down and going down the inflatable slide. Afterwards, the students visited the animals followed by a train ride.

Chicks at Batchwood

On Monday 29th June, a representative from the Living Eggs company brought an incubator to the Batchwood Science Department, along with a dozen live eggs. He also brought a brood box and all the food and equipment we would need to hatch our eggs.

Staff and students waited with anticipation until Wednesday, when the first egg cracked and the first chick fought to get out. When it got out it was wet and bedraggled and needed a rest. It soon dried and fluffed up. Soon six eggs had hatched and we had three brown chicks and three yellow ones. Due to their breed, we knew that the brown ones were female and the yellow ones were male. Later that day four more eggs hatched and we had four brown and six yellow **chicks altogether. The last two eggs didn't hatch** but we were advised by Living Eggs that three or four were likely not to hatch, so a total of ten was a very good result.



Once all the chicks were dry and fluffy they were moved from the incubator to the brood box where they could run around.

After the weekend, the chicks were taken outside to a special pen for a few hours and everyone who wanted to could come and hold them. The students all enjoyed observing and handling the chicks.

The brown female chicks went to live with Miss Matthews, who keeps chickens at her family home, and the yellow male chicks were rehomed by Living Eggs at a free-range farm.



Music

This year in music lessons, the students have covered many topics; including the blues, pod-casting, hip-hop and live sound. They have all shown an excellent level of musicianship and supported each other throughout their learning.

In our after-school music club, the students have formed small groups and been practising songs for our school festival **"Batch Fest"** which is taking place at the end of term.
